

Color in the countries of Europe.




FLAG OF FRANCE

HOW TO DRAW THE EIFFEL TOWER









Start by drawing two curving lines for the sides of the tower, and add a rounded part and a spike at the top.

Add two bumps at the sides for the second floor, then extend the curving a little more.


Add the first floor, then draw four curved pillar shapes for the legs of the tower.



Draw lines to separate the different sections of the tower.



Fill in the shape of the tower with a grid pattern, leaving the middle space empty.




Draw an X in each box of the grid, to make the tower's criss-cross design.







CROQUE MONSIEUR

Ingredients

For the béchamel sauce: ¼ cup unsalted butter (½ stick) ¼ cup all-purpose flour 1½ cups whole milk salt and freshly ground black pepper 1/4 teaspoon dijon mustard dash of ground nutmed

For the sandwich: 8 slices of bread Sliced ham Grated Emmenthal or Gruyere cheese Grated Parmesan cheese

Instructions:

- 1. Melt butter in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Whisk in flour and cook, stirring constantly, for about 3 minutes. Gradually add milk, stirring well until the mixture is smooth.
- 2. Cook, stirring, until sauce is thickened. Season with a little bit of salt and pepper.
- 3. Preheat oven to 425° F. Line a baking tray with parchment paper and set aside.
- 4. Spread each bread slice with a layer of béchamel, spreading it all the way to the edges. Place 4 slices of bread, béchamel side up, on prepared baking sheet. Top each with a piece of ham, a handful of gruyere, and a sprinkle of parmesan cheese. Place remaining slices of bread on top, béchamel side up, then top with remaining gruyere and parmesan cheese.
- 5. Bake at 425 degrees F for about 5-6 minutes, until cheese is melted, and then turn the oven to broil and broil until the cheese on top is lightly golden, 2-4 minutes.

CRÈME BRÛLÉE

Ingredients

For the custard:

2 cups heavy cream

10 tablespoons sugar

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

4 large egg yolks

1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

1/4 teaspoon salt

Instructions

1. In a medium saucepan, combine heavy cream, 4 tablespoons of the sugar, vanilla, and salt.

For the Brûlée topping:


(2 teaspoons per ramekin)

4 tablespoons sugar

- 2. Cook over medium heat, until it begins to simmer. Remove the pan from heat. Place the egg yolks in a medium-sized bowl. Whisk the remaining 6 tablespoons of sugar into the yolks. While whisking, slowly add the cream to the egg mixture a little at a time, followed by the vanilla extract. Strain the mixture through a fine sieve into a second bowl (optional; this helps strain out any small bits of egg that may have curdled). Let the custard cool.
- 3. Divide the custard between the ramekins, filling each one about three-quarters of the way full. Place the ramekins into a deep baking pan. Fill the pan with boiling water until the water comes about two-thirds of the way up the side of the ramekins. Bake for 38 to 40 minutes.
- 4. When ready, the crème brûlée should have a slight jiggle in the middle. If the sides hold firm but the center sloshes, they aren't quite done yet. Let the custards cool.
- 5. Cover each ramekin with plastic wrap and store in the fridge. Chill for at least 4 hours. When ready to serve, remove the custards from the fridge. Sprinkle the surface of each custard evenly with about 2 teaspoons of granulated sugar. Bake the custards in a very hot oven for only a few minutes, until the sugar has melted and begun to brown. Serve within 20 minutes.

A great artist of france was Claude Monet. He used a style of painting called 'Impressionism'. Monet used to paint beautiful scenes that he saw. One of his most famous works is a series of about 250 paintings called 'Water lilies'. Some of his paintings are at famous museums, where you can see them today, and they still inspire many people.

Louis Pasteur developed vaccines for diseases called anthrax and rabies. He also invented 'Pasteurization', which is a way of treating milk and wine so that it doesn't go sour as soon. As a child he liked painting and sketching. He once saved france's silk industry by helping farmers deal with diseased silkworms. The Times newspaper in Britain called him 'One of the scientific glories of France.' He helped convince doctors to wash their hands and sanitize their equipment.

Louis Braille invented Braille, helping blind people to read and write. When he was young, he hurt his eye in an accident, and went blind at the age of 5. He went to a school for the blind, where they had books of raised letters, but the letters had to be very big, and he found it to hard to learn to read like that. At the age of 15, he invented braille after hearing about morse code (made of dots and dashes).

Marquis De La Fayette, or just Lafayette, was an important military leader. He fought in the American Revolution, under George Washington. Then he went back to France, and he became commander-in-chief of the Garde nationale during the French revolution. He had a very long full name, Marie-Joseph Paul Yves Roch Gilbert du Motier de La Fayette! He was nicknamed 'Hero of two worlds'.

Napoleon Bonaparte was the Emperor of France a couple of times. He was the first emperor to crown himself, which he did in the Notre Dame cathedral. He was also king of Italy once, and the first Consul of France.

One of his great victories was the battle of Marengo, where he fought a man called General Melas. His horse was also called Marengo. He built a great empire, but it collapsed in 1815. His final battle was the battle of Waterloo. He was defeated and sent to an island called St. Helena, where he spent the rest of his life.


