# WELCOME TO AUSTRALIA

Did you know that Australia was first called 'New Holland'? Well that was because Dutch explorers landed on the fine Aussie shores in 1606, so therefore 'New Holland' became its name as this was now their second home.

Then the British arrived in 1788 and set up the first ever colony. Amazingly the British sent criminals to Australia as punishment many, many years ago, and this little bit of history still lives with Australia today.

The name Australia was given to the country in 1824. It comes from the word 'terra australis incognita' that means 'unknown southern island'.

## AUSTRALIA FUN FACTS

Australia is home to many unique animals, including the koala, kangaroo, emu, kookaburra and platypus. There are over 750 reptile species, more than any other country. Some, like the tiger snake, brown snake, and taipan, are very dangerous and some harmless. Australia is also home to 2,500 kinds of spiders. About 50 of these are poisonous.

Australians have tried to keep out certain animals in various parts of the country. In 1885, they built the dingo fence in Southeast Australia. It is 5,614 kilometers or 3,488 miles long! Then in 1907, they built a rabbit-proof fence in Western Australia that was 3,253 kilometers or 2,021 miles long.

In Australia, Kangaroos are also known as 'roos and you'll see them in the wild, and even on the beach. You'll also see wild camels. Over a million of them live in the outback.

Australia is home to the Great Barrier Reef is only slightly smaller than Germany or the state of Montana. Over 1,500 kinds of fish, including Nemo's family, clownfish, live there. The reef is big enough to be seen from space!

You'll find the largest cattle ranches in the world in Australia - yup - even bigger than in Texas. These cattle ranches are often called stations. The biggest about the size of the state of Vermont and bigger than the country of Israel! Australians also raise sheep on huge sheep stations.

Australia was originally inhabited by aboriginal people. Europeans arrived much more recently. In 1770, the British claimed the continent for their queen. In a few years, they started sending British prisoners to Australia. Between 1788 and 1868, they sent about 162,000 convicts there. About twenty percent of Australians today are descendants of British prisoners!

The name 'Australia' comes from the Latin word 'australis', which means southern.

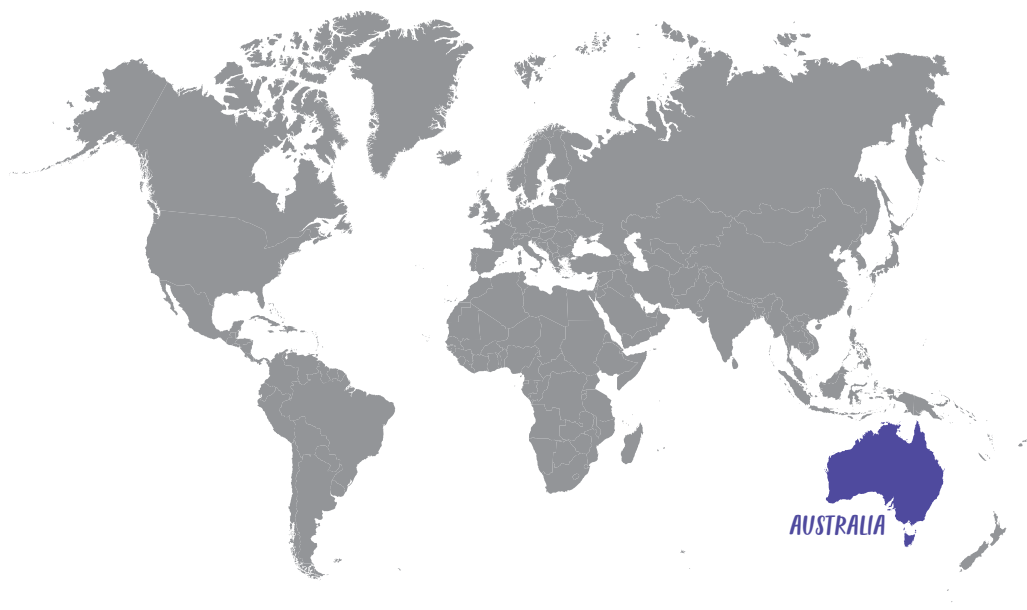

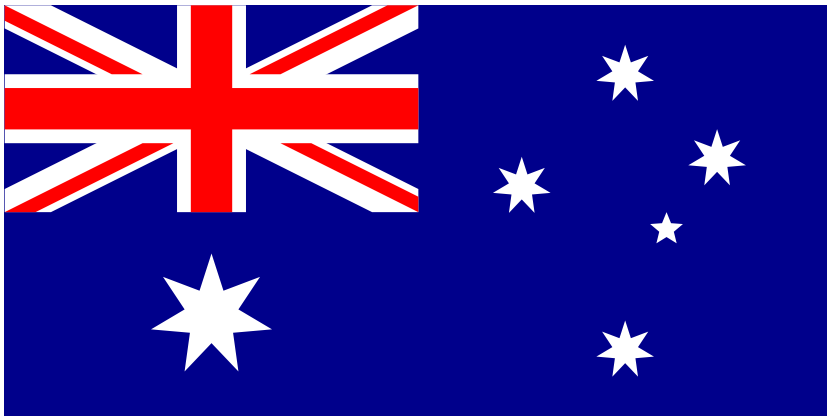


THE TWELVE APOSTLES

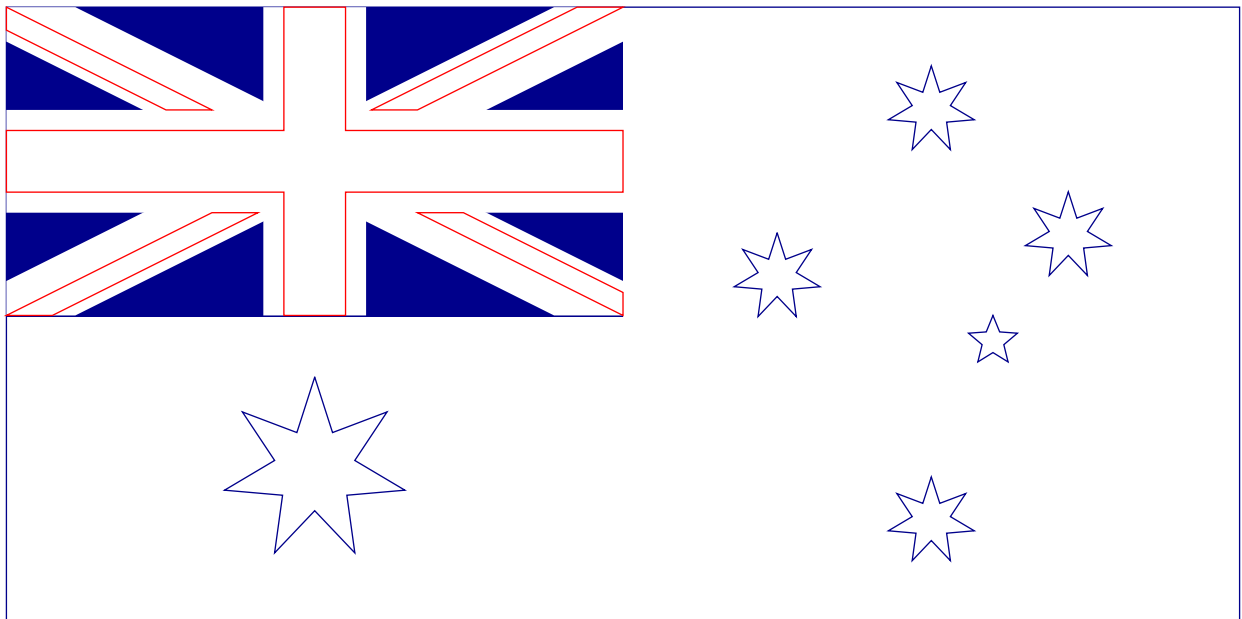




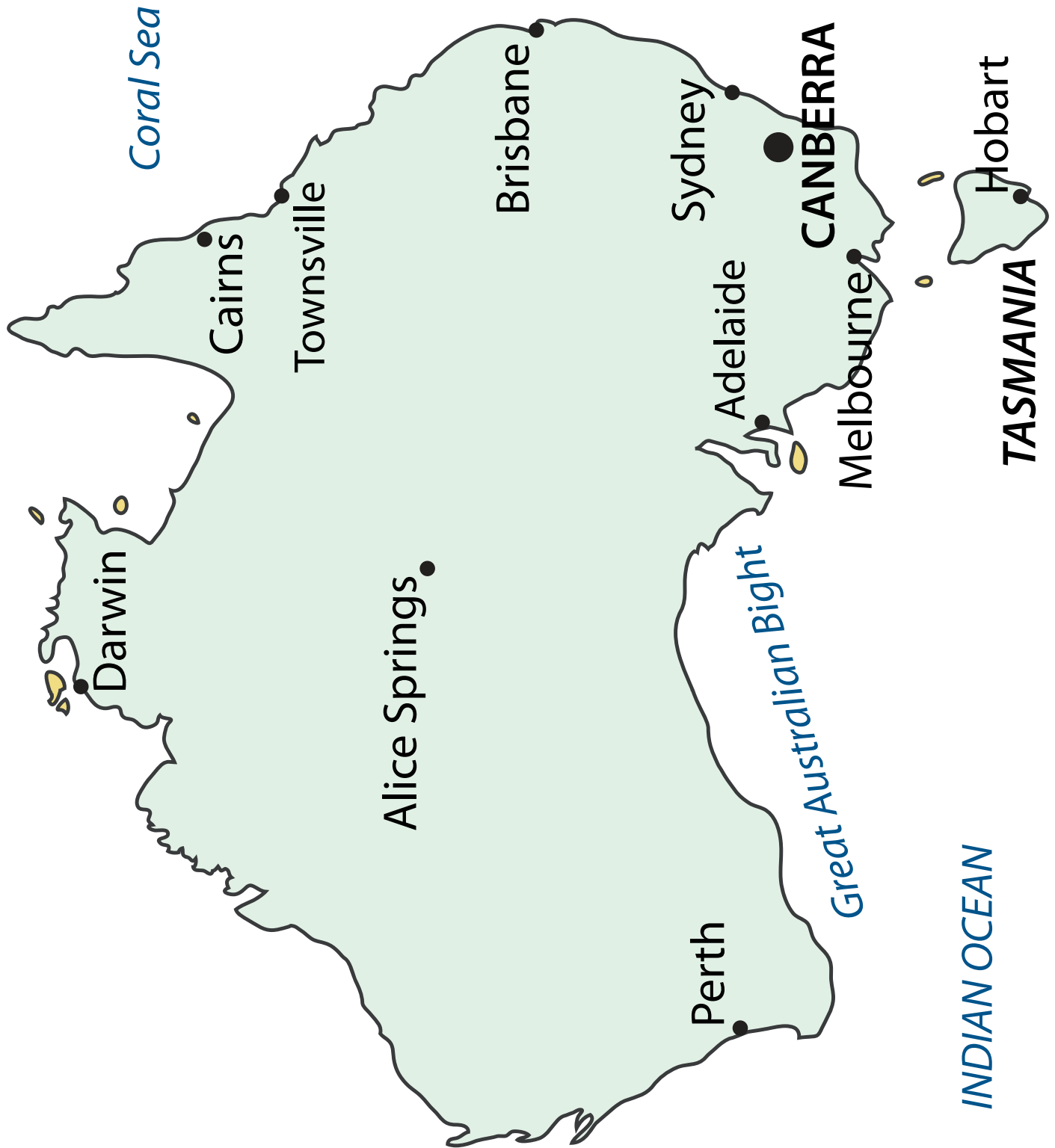
## FLAG OF AUSTRALIA

Color in the rest of the flag below.

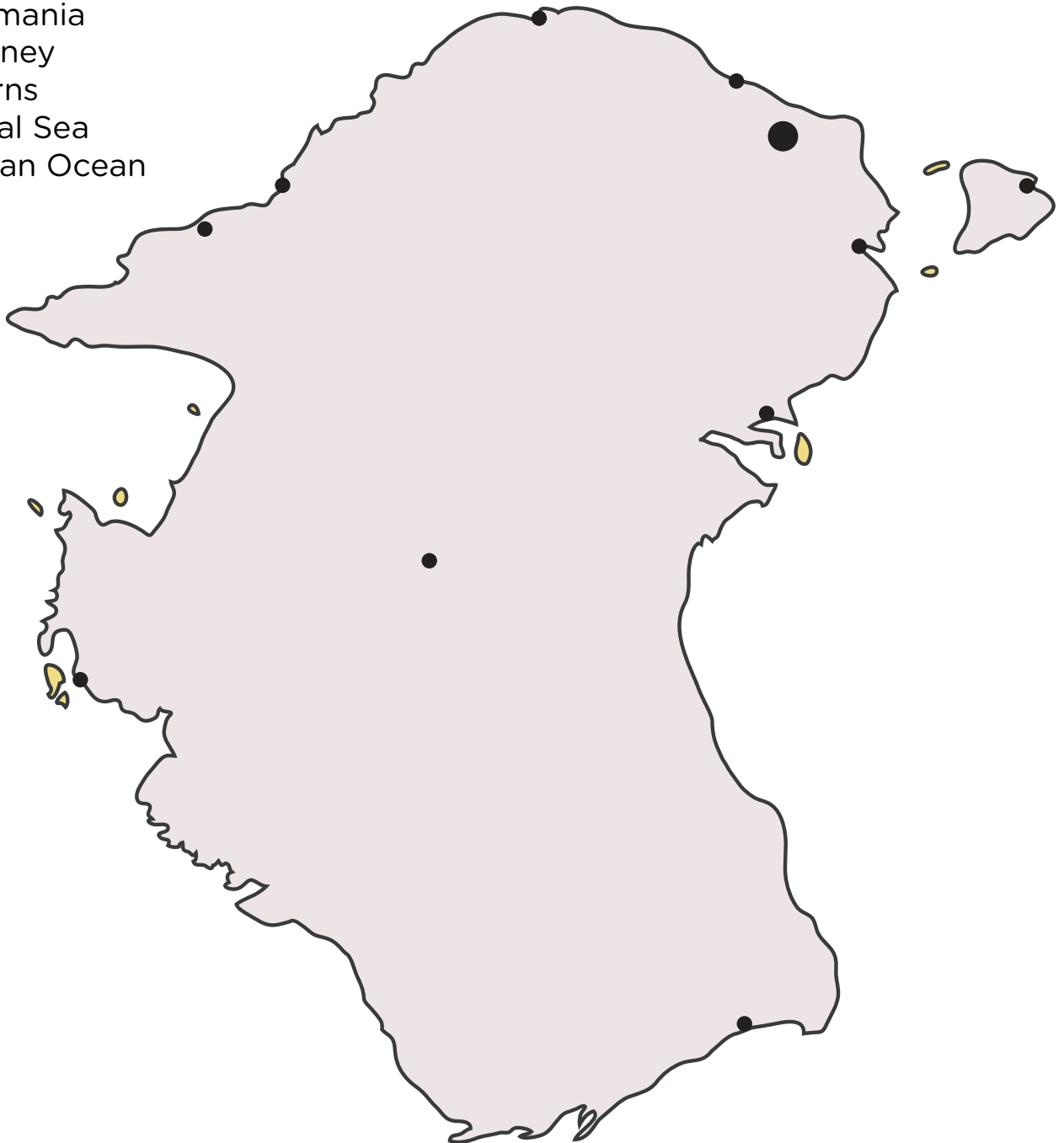


# MAP OF AUSTRALIA

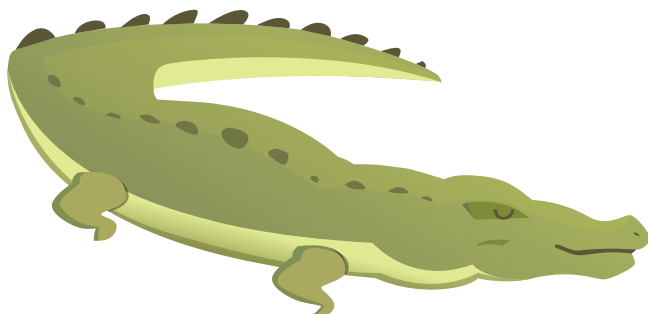
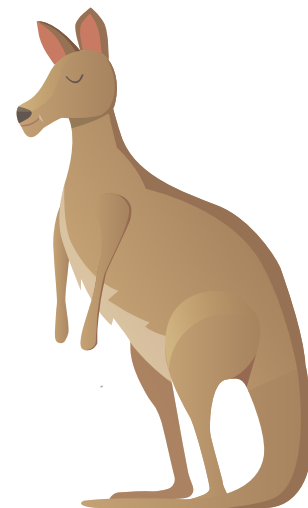

'Put a sock in it' is to tell somebody to "be quiet."

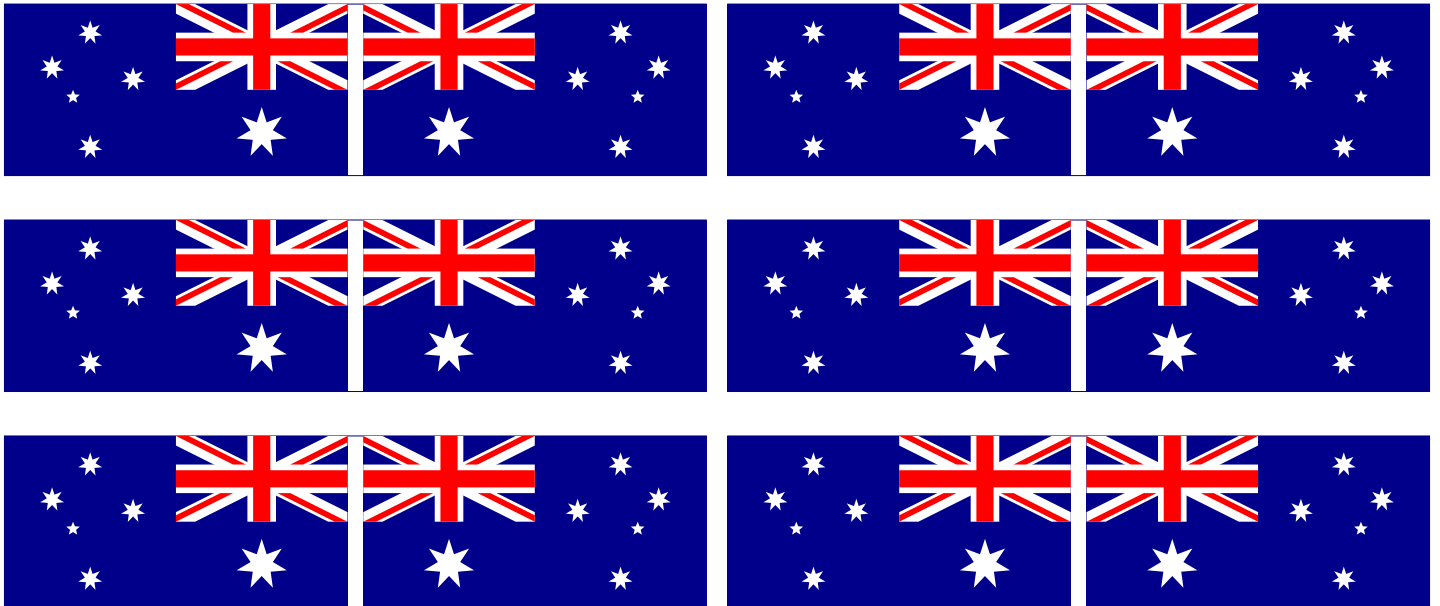

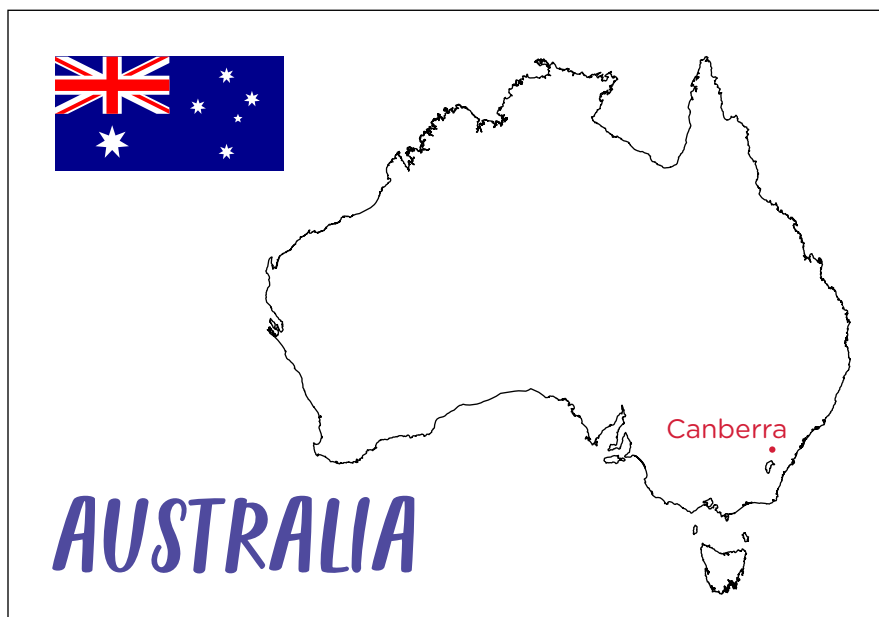

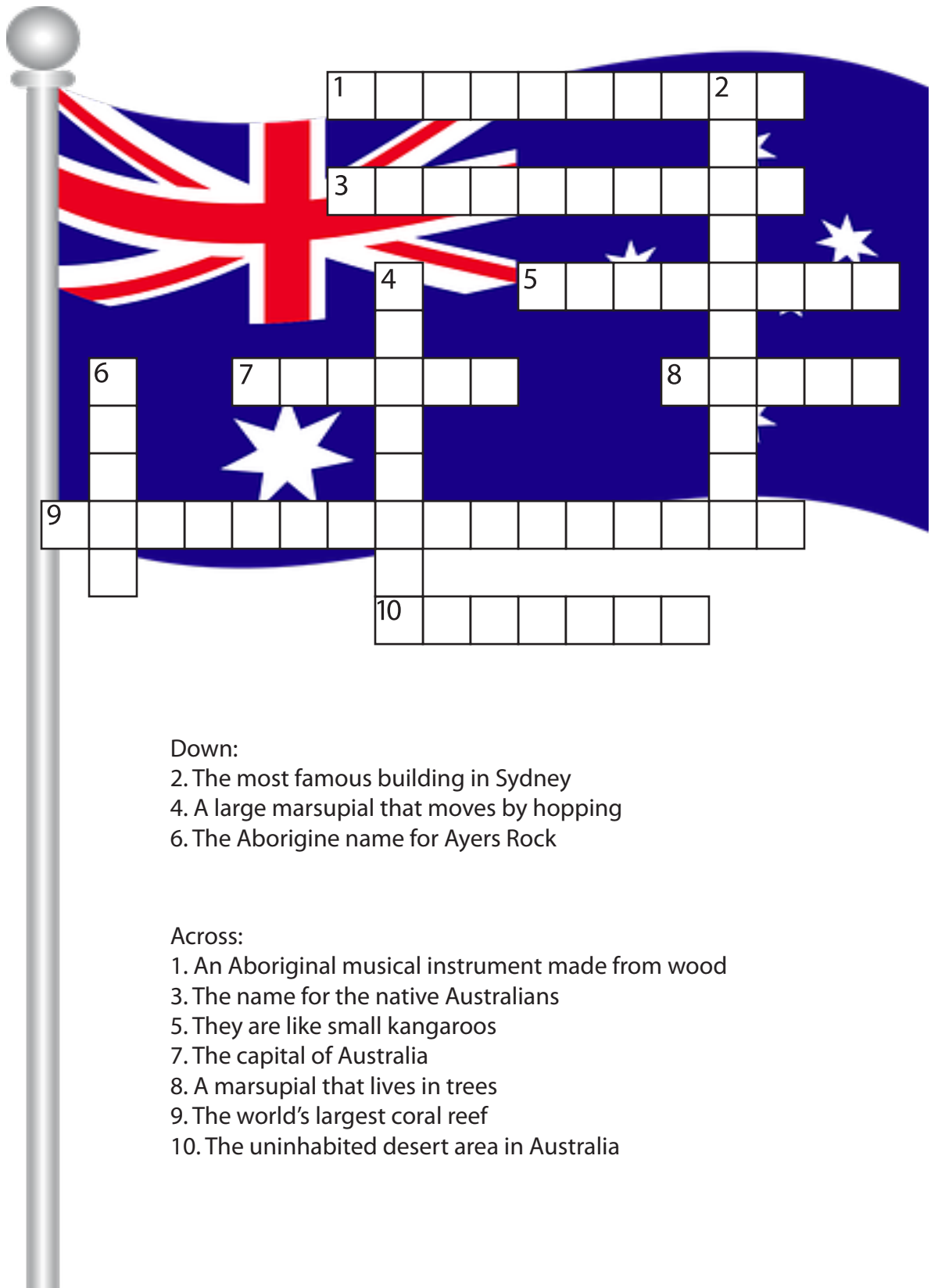


cut around each double flag set and glue around a toothpick

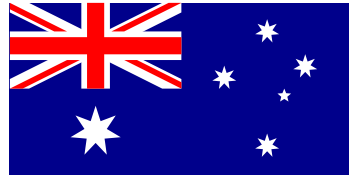
